Unsafe Acts Cause Most Harm at Work

Toxic gas leaks, faulty equipment, stormy weather, poor lighting — these are just some of the many conditions that can put your safety at risk on the job. Yet unsafe conditions account for a small minority of workplace incidents resulting in illness, injury or death. Most statistics across North America indicate about 80% — are caused by <u>Unsafe Acts</u>.

Some unsafe behaviors result in <u>Unsafe Conditions</u>. An example, failing to maintain good housekeeping can result in all sorts of hazards.

How a person behaves isn't always related to his or her skill level. In fact, highly skilled employees might actually display some of the most dangerous behaviors.

One reason for that is <u>Complacency</u>. Performing certain tasks for so long without incident that you disregard safe work procedures and become less diligent about potential hazards.

Much like complacency, <u>Overconfidence</u> can come from experience on the job. Overconfidence during a work task, familiar or something new, leads to unsafe acts.

Many incidents happen due to unsafe acts going unreported. We should all have a <u>Questioning</u> <u>Attitude</u>. Report the unsafe act or condition to your supervisor or Health & Safety designate so that it can be investigated to <u>Prevent</u> an incident before it occurs.

In a similar vein, failure to plan the work in advance can also lead to incidents. Being hasty in starting a task or not thinking through the process can put you in harm's way. Instead:
